Message from the President

Dear members,

At the time of writing last month's message to you all, I believed it would be my last message to you as President of our club.



Shortly after the writing of the newsletter, we realised we had a typographical error in our Constitution that required rectification prior to being able to conduct our AGM. We subsequently sought advice from NSW Department of Fair Trading, as to the method of rectification required and procedure required to achieve this. We notified members of the postponement of the AGM and scheduled a SGM to address two amendments that we proposed to make to the current constitution. The SGM has been held and the two advertised proposed amendments to the constitution were voted on and unanimously accepted by the members in attendance. The Secretary will submit the amended constitution to NSW Department of Fair Trading and upon notification of acceptance of the new constitution, a new AGM date will be announced to the membership.

Last month I had a letter from Kate Darling, the wife of popular member and player Trevor Darling (TrevorDa), to advise that Trevor due to failing health was no longer able to compete in our tournaments due to suffering a fall in February this year which resulted in him breaking his tibia on his right leg. He has never walked again and now resides in a nursing home. Kaye told me this little story about Trevor and his bridge story spanning more than 65 years.

At the age of 14, Trev was very sick for about six months, missing school. In an effort to pass the time of day with Trev, his Mum taught him to play Auction Bridge and spent many hours with him. Kaye says he was always very competitive. For many years he played this version of our game. In 1974 Kaye and Trev moved to Whyalla and Trev joined the local Contract bridge Club. He played regularly with three others at their home as well as at the club. Kaye remembers that they all talked ate ... slept "bridge", remembering , analysing hands from weeks before. Between 1974 and 1979, Trev and his partner were fortunate to top the State Pairs and performed very well in the Australia Wide Pairs. Trev's job saw them moving often so this interfered with his competitive game. In 1995 they moved to Wallaroo in South Australia and in time established a bridge club there. Next major event "Covid". Unable to play Face to Face, Trev was introduced to StepBridge. Like many others, he had zero computer skills. Thanks to Rita Jones and Trev's absolute pigheadedness, after many hours of frustration but always with a positive determination he started online with SBAU. Continue to next page.

Turkish Blog

Sarah's Turkish Adventures - continued

We travelled to Izmir province for a month by the seaside. We travelled from Duzce to Seferihisar by coach. 11 hours travel. Again there were safety issues with the drivers. Where possible we always book the seat in the front opposite side to the driver. The view is great BUT also one can see what the driver is doing. These coaches have 2 drivers and a cabin host who serves tea, coffee, water, snacks etc. At times the spare driver and cabin crew will sit in fold down seats in the entranceway to the coach. It is disconcerting that they constantly chat and the driver can be seen looking at his co-workers while talking and NOT at the road ahead. The driver has 2 phones. A personal one and one which is a work phone. The driver does not use hands free for either phone. We had 4 incidents of near misses!!! At one point the driver was looking at his phone and the coach was about to mow down a line of witches hats delineating the lanes. I yelled at him!! much to Orhan's horror. This guy was obviously new to the route and he constantly referred to google maps navigation to determine which road to take. Happily he got the message after I yelled at him and one of the other guys took over the navigation instructions. Perilous to say the least. There is no dozing off and sleeping. I am watching every move the driver makes from beginning to end. I am exhausted by the end of the trip. I feel like I am the navigator in a car rally!!!!

We are staying in the seaside town of Sığacık, Seferihisar/İzmir. Sığacık is next to the ancient Ionian city of Teos. There is an Ottoman castle (now in ruins) built in 1522 on the edge of the seaside. There are hundreds of cafes, restaurants, market stalls and even some boutique hotels, all within the walls of the ruined castle. Amazing atmosphere of music, food and a sense of tranquillity within the walls of the castle. The Teos Marina has great bars and restaurants and of course boutiques selling everything at over inflated prices. Already we notice that prices we paid when on holidays a year ago are maybe 5 to 6 times higher now. You cannot go to a restaurant without first enquiring what a meal will cost. All the prices are removed. The rent of a banana lounge at the beach yesterday cost 130 lira. The ticket said 40!!! They don't even bother to print new tickets.

It is amazing to see the number of street dogs and cats everywhere. All in fantastic condition. There are buckets of water in every shady spot for the animals. All the shops and cafes have havens for shelter and food for the animals. I was looking at trinkets in a market stall, and a big pure white cat jumped up onto the counter and sat in front of me demanding attention. We were at a pub the other night listening to music. A large black dog worked the room all night. He would go from table to table and just sit. Eventually the patrons would give in and offer him some food. He was very patient and well mannered. No wonder the animals are all so fat. I have posted a photo of a banner hanging on the walls of the ruined castle, here is a translation of this banner.

In Accordance with the Animal Protection Law No 5199 "Streets shall be reserved for homeless animals" "It is a Living Space" Harming Animals is punishable. Also to prevent them from being fed

The street animals are so well cared for you can see trays and bowls of dried food laid out every day for them. It is as if there is an unwritten law between the species. The dogs do not touch the cat food or encroach on their territory. The weather is very hot here and there are plentiful supplies of buckets of water placed in shady locations for the animals. In the photo taken on the beach there are 9 cats. Can you spot them all?

We have been driving around the seaside towns looking at potential summer house locations. Every little town we go to I think - this is the one - to have it replaced in my mind by the very next place we visit. I can see we are spoiled for choice. Yesterday we took a trip to Kuşadası. As many of you have told me previously you loved your visit to this city. It was my first time and I could happily live in Kuşadası.

We went to the mountain village of Şirince, Selçuk/İzmir. Very close to the ancient ruined city of Ephesus. This is a village of stalls, cafes and wine cellars. Narrow winding lanes. Picturesque and delightful. We bought some bottles of wine and a coffee liqueur and bubbly, all made locally from the regional grapes. 2750tl \$160 approx for 7 bottles.

It has a quirky story to tell as well. In December 2012 believers of the ancient Mayan doomsday cultists believed that Şirince was one of only two places in the world that could be a possible haven in the predicted apocalypse "doomsday" foretold by Mayan hieroglyphs. The village is said to be a site of great positive energy. The predicted apocalypse was in winter time here and yet that week saw an influx of more than 60,000 people seeking shelter from the impending doom. Needless to say, the day passed without incident. What a great boost for local tourism. However, a "must see" to put on your bucket list.

During our travels we passed a country town mosque and I wasn't taking particular notice. However the scene on the skyline made me look again and there was a pelican sitting on the top of the minaret. I was not quick enough to snap a picture but it was amazing to see. Sure looked like an Australian pelican.

Let me tell you about my telephone disaster. I should tell you that I did know this was a possibility but I did not understand the full ramifications. In Turkiye the tax department requires that if you are using a mobile phone that is purchased outside of this country, you are required to register it here and pay appropriate taxes. Failure to do this will result in the phone being blocked. I have been here for 18 months and have been using my Australian purchased phone with a Turkish phone network SIM card. It has never been blocked.....until yesterday. The government had a big purge apparently and without warning blocked all unregistered phones. I thought I could be clever and swap SIM cards with my Turkish purchased phone. Haaaa. My 2nd phone is a cheap and nasty phone that has sufficed for just phone calls and texts too and from Australia principally for SBAU requirements. Fortunately it has a twin SIM capability and so now I am using it for AU and TRY phone calls. However my precious Galaxy 21+ has been killed forever for phone calls and texts, until and unless I pay the Turkish tax department 30000tl. Approx \$1750. I have found a partial solution. The block has not prevented me from using the phone for wifi/internet apps and so I have hotspotted the Turkish phone to provide service to the blocked phone when I am outside of wifi at home. I was really distressed initially when I realised the full impact of the block, however I am reasonably satisfied with my partial workaround. Shhhhhhhhhhhhhhhhhh please don't tell the Tax Office. Oh by the way, small print on the website. If you have unpaid for more than 365 days, they won't accept payment or unblock the device anyway, should one be stupid enough to pay.

The weather forecast suggests summer is coming to an end. By the end of the week the temperatures here will have a maximum of 25 or 26 degrees. Saturday 30th September we leave this glorious spot and head home for a while. Time to prepare before winter descends on Duzce.





Cookery Corner

Brenda's Sausage Rolls

Ingredients

- 500g Sausage mince
- Half jar chutney
- 1 small finely diced onion
- 1 egg
- 4 slices bread in water and squeezed out

Directions

- Mix altogether and put on puff pastry (I cut the sheets in half).
- Roll and then cut into desired size. Brush with milk.
- Hot oven for 10 minutes (220C) then turn down to 190C for 20 minutes.

Jam Cream Slices

Ingredients

- Puff pastry sheets
- Jam
- Cream
- Icing Sugar

Directions

- Cut puff pastry sheets (Cut in half and the 3 more times, so you get about 8 pieces)
- Lay on tray and bake for around 10 minutes at 180C
- When sheets are cold after baking, spread half of them with jam
- Top with beaten cream and put other half of sheets on
- Sprinkle with icing sugar







Bridge Article

'Michel' or 'Omar' (As He Was Known) Loved His Bridge. We are fortunate that he has given us many clever quotes to help us understand why we, like this famous movie star, are obsessed and addicted to this game.

One quote from Omar sharif that is often repeated is that he was interested in two things during his life, his Bridge, and his horses. But that is not completely true as he also had a third passion. This was for the many women who shared in his life.

But first where did he come from? It was Alexandra, Egypt where he was born in 1932.



Here is a picture of Alexandra from the 1930's. The Chalhoub family were of Greek Catholic Lebanese origin, successful merchants, well connected and life was good. His mother was a serious card gambler and was invited to many parties. Can you imagine how life was? Lots of social activity in a very hierarchical, cultured society.

Michel lived well. He was attracted to the stage and he adopted a stage surname 'Sharif' (Arabic for 'noble') to make himself more acceptable to Egyptian movie Directors.

Always attracted to beautiful women he made a really big decision when aged 23 to pour his amorous passionate attentions onto a special young woman, an Egyptian child acting star now aged 24. She was married with a daughter but her much older Egyptian movie Director husband graciously agreed to divorce her so that she was 'free'. Her name was Faten Hamama. She was though unreachable as she was a Muslim. This was not a barrier for Michel Sharif, for he then changed his faith, becoming a Muslim and hence became the leading Arabic figure 'Omar Sharif' who we know so well. They married in 1955.

Faten was very much a star in her own right and their marriage was feted by the Egyptian movie world and general population as glamorous and succesful. Omar had got his first big break in the movie *Struggle in the Valley* in 1955 playing opposite Faten. It was this movie which began their life together. It was a match made in movie publicist's heaven and they had a son.

Omar Sharif had a busy life acting in Egyptian movies. He was successful and busy. Then he was given his first English speaking role in *Lawrence of Arabia* starring with Peter O'Toole in 1962. It made him an international star. Then *Dr Zhivago* with Julie Christie and *Funny Girl* with Barbara Streisand. It was rumoured he was 'friendly' with most of these beautiful women he met.



He once said "Don't expect me to enumerate my affairs. I neither want to mention them nor have the right to do so. Gallantry forbids me doing this..." [The Eternal Male p.28]. But he did say regarding Barbara Streisand "I fell madly in love with her talent and her personality" [p.79].



Omar Sharif apparently took every role offered because he indulged himself financially with horses and gambled unrestrainedly with cards, especially when he discovered 'Bridge'.

Some of his movies are best forgotten but dare we be uncharitable and mention *Genghis Khan, Prince of Conquerors* from 1965? Despite starring other well-known actors of the day, it was considered an awful (nowadays unacceptable) movie. Here he starred as Genghis Khan and his leading lady was the glamorous French actress Francois Dorleac. The movie was described as 'eight centuries in the making' and apparently contained such dialogue as '*Teach her to be a woman while I'm away'*.

But it was through Bridge that we enthusiasts really became to know Omar Sharif. He made Bridge international and desirable. His Bridge career is worthy of great appreciation especially from 1967 onwards with his travelling 'Bridge Circus', and his many books. His enthusiasm brought Bridge to many people. Here are two of his lesser-known quotes about the game we love. They are fitting. We would certainly agree.

"Bridge is a sport of the mind, it's a passion, an escape, a recreation, and for me, it's very important" [p.169].

"You don't need a drawerful of diplomas to be a good Bridge player To be played properly, the game also calls for passion. Bridge, unlike Poker, isn't based on luck but on intelligence. It's the perfect game" [p.163].
